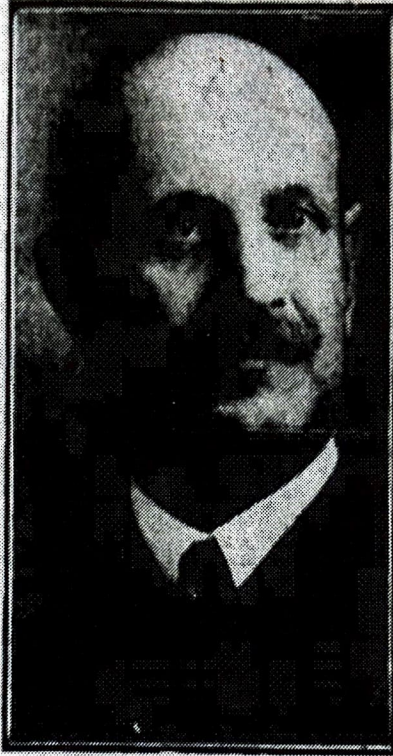

CHOSEN PRESIDENT OF COUNTY CLERKS' BODY

J. L. Hotchkiss Honored at Annual Meeting.

James L. Hotchkiss, Monroe county clerk and chairman of the Monroe County Republican Committee, was elected president of the County Clerks of the State of New York at the annual meeting of the organization held yesterday in the Union Trust building. Arthur C. Meade, county clerk of Oneida county, was made first vice-president, and other officers were filled as follows: Second vice-president, J. Hunter Black, county clerk of Livingston county; third vice-president, Egbert T. Cross, of Fulton county; secretary and treasurer, Miss Ellen P. Yates, Chautauque county. Senator William J. Hefferman, deputy county clerk of Kings county, was made chairman of the Executive Committee.

The clerks endorsed the Thayer bill affecting fees in county clerks' offices, also the Wheelock bill for raising the marriage license fee from one dollar to two dollars, and for increasing the fee for hunting licenses from \$1.10 to \$1.25.

J. Hunter Black, of Livingston county, acted as temporary chairman and Miss Yates, of Chautauque county, as temporary secretary. Messrs. Hefferman, Black and Hotchkiss were appointed to act as a committee to draft by-laws and a constitution.
